ARTICLE FROM HEADMISTRESS

Creativity with Sponge Painting



Reading Sentences with CVC Words



Health, Safety and Child Protection (HSCP) Practices



Health, Safety and Well-Being Highlights

A series of activities and training sessions were organised during September and October 2025 to strengthen awareness and preparedness among students and staff regarding safety and well-being.

On 23rd September 2025, a First Aid and Fire Safety Awareness session was conducted by Mr. Ramesh Bhagwani, Senior Trainer from NIST, for the school staff. The session aimed to ensure that all members are well-prepared to respond effectively during emergencies, creating a secure environment conducive to learning and well-being. It also highlighted the importance of regular updates and continued training in life-saving skills.

On 3rd October 2025, a Bus Safety Drill was held for students of Grades VI to IX to train them on emergency responses during incidents like fire or accidents while travelling. Under the guidance of HSCP Coordinator, Ms. Seema Garg, students learned to locate and operate the emergency exit lock and practised safe evacuation from the bus. Teachers and Bus Attendants participated actively, ensuring smooth coordination and safety throughout the drill.

Continuing the focus on safety awareness, a Cyber Safety Session was organised on 8th October 2025 for students of Grades VIII and IX by Mr. Gobind Singh from KPMG. The session educated students about responsible online behaviour and the importance of safeguarding personal information. Key takeaways included creating strong passwords, avoiding suspicious links, and maintaining caution while interacting online. The initiative equipped students with essential knowledge to stay safe and responsible in the digital world.
